Genealogy: How to get started

Have you ever wanted to research your family tree? Where would you start? We asked Jonna Peterson, a member of the La Crosse Area Genealogical Society to give us some tips on how to do it. Watch for more tips in the next Cornerstones.

If a person wants to research their family tree, where's the best place to start?

The best place is to start with yourself. Fill out a family history chart. Next, you want to talk to your relatives, especially the older folk who may remember information that will help provide clues to your search. As an example, what counties, states, etc that your family lived in. This will help when you go to find vital records — and finding the county that may hold your family records.

Dedicates Wall of Honor for Veterans

November 11, 2004, was a time to remember the contributions and sacrifices the men and women who have served, and are currently serving, in the Armed Forces.

Oak Grove Cemetery selected Veteran's Day to dedicate the new Wall of Honor for Veterans; a special section to serve as a final resting place for veterans and their families. More than 80 people attended the event. The day was bright and clear — and chilly for November.

Event participants included Jim Gausmann, La Crosse County Veterans Service Officer; Capt. Mark Jolivette, Chaplain Corps, US Navy; Jerry Miller, President, Oak Grove Cemetery Board of Trustees; Val Reinke, Executive Director, Oak Grove Cemetery; and VFW Post 1530 Color Guard and Firing Squad. The local band "The Grumpy Old Men" provided the music.

The raising of the flag was an emotional moment. The lighted flagpole for the Wall of Honor was donated by Louis Robinson, a long-time trustee of Oak Grove Cemetery. Louis was a veteran himself, having served in the 14th Armored Division, Battery B of the 501st Artillery in WWII. Louis passed away in August at the age of 80. His sons, Paul, David and Mark helped raise the flag on the pole that their father donated.

About the Wall of Honor

The Wall of Honor includes niches, for veterans and their family member who choose cremation, and crypts for people who prefer a full body entombment. The area is adorned with five large bronze emblems for each of branch of the military, next to a large plaque recognizing the determination and sacrifice of our nation's military personnel, which reads: "Duty, Honor, Country. The willingness to sacrifice is the prelude to freedom. This memorial is dedicated with appreciation to the men and women whose loyalty and service during times of war and peace define the character of this great nation."

Superintendent's Corner Spring Decorations

Spring is right around the corner — a very busy time for all of us at Oak Grove. I'd like to take this opportunity to review our policies regarding spring decorations. I know that some of these rules may sound strict, but please know that by following them you help us to maintain our beautiful 80-acre facility.

- ◆ Please remove any winter decorations before April 1. Once April begins, we start gearing up for the season and will need to remove and dispose of any leftover winter decorations.
- ◆ Please be aware that we will remove any weathered or unsightly artificial flowers or decorations at any time of the year.
- ◆ We do not allow perennial plants on graves.
- ◆ For safety's sake, we do not allow artificial decorations on the ground. Artificial flowers are allowed in a vase on a stand, or tied onto a monument.

- ◆ Potted plants are permitted on Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day and Memorial Day. They may remain on the graves until the next mowing cycle. We are not able to store any potted plants that we remove when we mow.
- ◆ Oak Grove offers flower services to keep your loved one's gravesite beautiful. There are a number of options, from a one-time small arrangement to perpetual care. Call us or check out our web site at www.oakgrovecemetery.com for details.
- ◆ We also offer niche and crypt front bouquets. Please call us for details.
- ◆ You may plant annual flowers in the ground at a graveside as long as the planted area does not exceed more than one foot in front of the marker or monument, and is no wider than the monument or marker.

Our web site has the full listing of all of Oak Grove's rules and regulations. We update these annually. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to give us a call. Thank you for your attention and cooperation.
