## The importance of planning ahead Consider these two scenarios:

### Situation 1:

John dies unexpectedly. He has made no plans for his funeral or burial. His wife Mary, in addition to being in shock, now has to make hundreds of decisions without his guidance. He actually wanted to be cremated, but since they never discussed this, Mary decides on a traditional in-ground burial. She selects a middle-to-higher end casket, and buys a family plot in the cemetery that her parents buried in, in North Dakota. She easily spends more than \$15,000 at a time when future income is uncertain. In addition, Mary and John's children try to plan the funeral service, and get into heated arguments over what Dad would have wanted for music, scripture, pallbearers, etc. The family had not been affiliated with any church, so determining where to have the funeral service is challenging.

**Summary: Besides their enormous grief, John's family burdened – emotionally and financially – by John's lack of planning.**

### Situation 2:

John dies unexpectedly. But ten years ago, he made his final plans. He and Mary discussed the issue, and decided they would both be cremated and have their remains in a mausoleum at Oak Grove Cemetery so their children could visit. John worked directly with Oak Grove Cemetery, and paid for the cremation and space in the mausoleum. The cost was less than \$1,000 per person, and had

been paid in full in 1991, at 1991's prices. John also made plans for his funeral. Because he was working with Oak Grove Cemetery, the family was able to have the funeral in Oak Grove's chapel at no charge.

**Summary: John's family is still grieving, but without the added pressure of last-minute decision-making. John has also saved them a significant amount of money by pre-paying when he made his final plans.**

In the midst of daily living, it is often difficult to discuss the practical realities of death. However, experience has shown that advance planning avoids most of the unnecessary emotional and financial problems that many people face. Knowing that your family will not be burdened by making hasty decisions, and that your plans have been made according to your wishes is one of the most thoughtful expressions of love and concern that you can show your family.

The cost of cemetery and funeral arrangements continues to rise. By planning ahead, you can do your research and compare prices. Another advantage is that you pay for everything at today's prices and avoid the effects of inflation.

## Planning for a Funeral

**The Federal Trade Commission offers these tips for planning for a funeral:**

- ♦ Shop around in advance. Compare prices from at least two funeral homes. Remember that you can supply your own casket or urn.
- ♦ Ask for a price list. The law requires funeral homes to give you written price lists for products and services.
- ♦ Resist pressure to buy goods and services you don't really want or need.
- ♦ Avoid emotional overspending. It's not necessary to have the fanciest casket or the most elaborate funeral to properly honor a loved one.

- ♦ Recognize your rights. Laws regarding funerals and burials vary from state to state. It's a smart move to know which goods or services the law requires you to purchase and which are optional.
- ♦ Apply the same smart shopping techniques you use for other major purchases. You can cut costs by limiting the viewing to one day or one hour before the funeral, and by dressing your loved one in a favorite outfit instead of costly burial clothing.
- ♦ Plan ahead. It allows you to comparison shop without time constraints, creates an opportunity for family discussion, and lifts some of the burden from your family.

# Columbarium

A columbarium is a freestanding structure that houses cremated remains. There are two columbaria at Oak Grove Cemetery.

## Famous sites:

### In The Cemetery: Mark Kellogg Historic Plaque

Next to the grave of Martha Robinson Kellogg (1838-1867) is perhaps the most fascinating historic marker in the Oak Grove Cemetery. The plaque is a tribute to La Crosse newspaperman Mark Kellogg, who was killed with Gen. George Armstrong Custer and the entire 7th US Cavalry at the Battle of the Little Big Horn on June 26, 1876.

Mark Kellogg (1833-1876) was born in Canada and came to La Crosse with his family in 1851. His father was postmaster in La Crosse and built the Kellogg House hotel in 1853. Mark worked as a reporter for the La Crosse Democrat and operated a flour and feed store for a while.

His wife died in 1867, and within the year he left La Crosse and spent the next nine years traveling in the American West as a correspondent for several newspapers. He was a pioneer in the use of telegraph communications and may be the first American wire service reporter killed in battle.

His gravesite and marker remain on the Custer Battlefield National Historic Site in Montana. The memorial plaque was erected at his wife's gravesite in his honor by several local newspaper, radio and television organizations. It was dedicated on June 26, 1976, the centennial of the Little Bighorn Battle.
