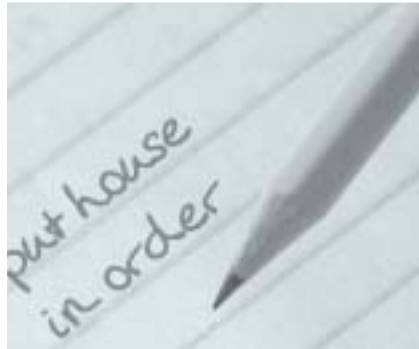

Besides the personal things we *want* to do, we absolutely *should* do several things before we die. One of these is commonly known as "putting your house in order," that is, finalizing and gathering together all of your important documents and making decisions about end-of-life and death issues.

What have you done to put your house in order? Oak Grove is ready to assist you in this process. We have recently published a planning guide to help you make decisions and gather your important documents. The Oak Grove Planning Guide is part document, part storage folder. The document asks you to identify where important papers are, and to include copies in the folder. 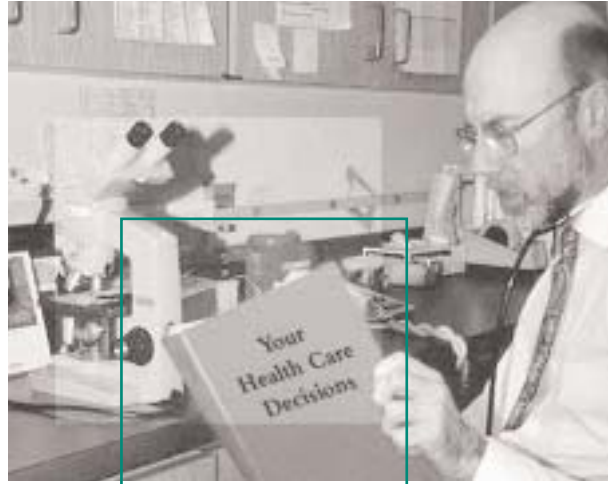

Of The Issue:

advance directives

Advance directives are written instructions that state how you want health care decisions to be made for you if you become incapacitated. Individuals who are of sound mind and are 18 or older may complete these forms. Wisconsin laws created two forms of advance directives for health care - the living will and the health care power of attorney.

- ♦ A **living will** (Declaration to Physicians) allows you to select the kind of life-sustaining care you would want if injury or illness leaves you in a terminal condition (dying) or a persistent vegetative state with no hope of recovery.
- ♦ With a **health care power of attorney**, you appoint someone to be your “agent” to make all health care



decisions - not just those involving life support - for you if you lose the ability to make decisions for yourself.

Famous sites:

In The Cemetery: Trane/Hood Memorial

A small crypt in Oak Grove Cemetery marks the final resting place for the Trane and Hood families. Norwegian immigrant James A. Trane (1857-1936) settled in La Crosse in 1864 when he was seven years old. As a young man he found work as a plumber and established his own plumbing, steam heating and gas fitting business on Pearl Street. James was an innovative inventor in the plumbing business.

His son, Reuben Trane (1886-1954), was also mechanically gifted and the two incorporated as partners in the Trane Company in 1913. The company received an important defense contract during World War II. After the war, the company became a major

international supplier of heating and cooling systems. Helen Hood (1891-1978) married Reuben in 1912 and Helen's brother Frank Hood and his son Wayne Hood all were actively involved in the family business.

For nearly a century, the Trane Company has been an important part of the La Crosse manufacturing economy. The gray granite Trane/Hood memorial is modestly ornamented with a plain horizontal cornice and carved detailing around the door.

What are my interment options? Oak Grove Cemetery

Have you thought about what you want to happen to your body after you die? Today there are so many choices available to consumers. Making your interment decisions known while you're still living will help your family at the time of your passing. The staff at Oak Grove Cemetery can explain these options in greater detail. The two basic options are cremation and full body interment.

Cremation

Cremation is an increasingly popular choice, for reasons ranging from religious beliefs or ethnic customs to cost. Many people select the process simply because of personal preference.

Some people are surprised to learn how many choices they have, including:

- ♦ **Direct family cremation:** The family arranges to bring the deceased directly to the crematorium, such as Oak Grove Cemetery. This does not involve a funeral director. A memorial service can still be held. This is a very cost-effective option, costing approximately \$350.
- ♦ **Cremation following a traditional visitation and funeral:** This choice involves a funeral director and a visitation or viewing with a funeral ceremony and church or memorial services. In Wisconsin, funeral homes are permitted to rent caskets for viewing and services. The cost for this type of service typically starts at \$1,500 - 2,000.

There are also a variety of options for the final disposition of cremated remains.



- ♦ Urns or other containers may be placed in a niche at a cemetery. Oak Grove has niches available in the Garden Mausoleum, Chapel and Historic Mausoleum.
- ♦ Families may elect to bury the urn in a family plot or cemetery or keep it in another place of personal significance, such as the home.
- ♦ The family may wish to scatter the ashes in a place that was significant to the deceased. Please check with your local and state laws first. Oak Grove Cemetery also provides an area for scattering.

Full Body

If you choose not to be cremated, there are still several choices for your interment. You can be:

- ♦ Buried in the ground in a traditional grave
- ♦ Entombed in an above-ground mausoleum

Oak Grove Cemetery offers both choices for individuals.

Superintendent earns cremationist certification

Oak Grove Cemetery Association is proud to announce that Adam Casper, Superintendent of Operations, has completed the Crematory Operator Certification Program through the Cremation Association of North America. As a part of the certification process, Casper studied the history of cremation, cremation statistics, professional terminology, principles of combustion and incinerator design, combustion terminology, cremation and the environment, handling and packaging of remains, crematory

recordkeeping, operation, maintenance and troubleshooting of crematory equipment and controlling operator exposure to communicable disease. Casper has been with the cemetery for more than 10 years. Oak Grove Cemetery provides cremation services for funeral home directors and directly to families. The crematorium service was initiated in 1979.

Opening soon: The Meadow at Oak Grove Cemetery
